Reports From Clubs

Thank you to the 32 of our 38 District 23 clubs that submitted their first club reports of the biennium for collation and sending to ZI. As was reported to you initially, this is the beginning of a new form of what it is believed will be much more accurate reporting which in turn will be useful for us to advocate on behalf of women, develop partnerships within our local and international communities, write submissions, apply for grants, have the media take note.....

As it was the first time the form developed by ZI (and trialled for a time in District 16) had been used, it was not unexpected that, across many languages and cultures, there could be some difficulties with it.

To paraphrase our International President Livie Ferry, completing the quarterly report helps clubs to:

- keep track of progress achieved by your club for the past 3 months
- review risks and limitations that could impact on the club's attainment of its biennial goals
- re-examine allocation of resources if required

Highlights from D23 clubs in our first report

Congratulations and thanks:

- to the 32 clubs that reported. This is one of the highest proportions across the Zonta world, so I thank you sincerely;
- to ZC Melbourne's West, the first club to submit its report;
- to Areas 4 and 5, where 100% of clubs responded.

After Area Directors had discussed the form with Presidents, clubs worked in different ways to complete it. My impression from anecdotal reports is that the clubs that had the least difficulty with the form were those where it was completed at a Board meeting, not where one member had total responsibility for collecting/chasing up the information.

Some clubs have reported that they have 'Update of data for club report' as an agenda item for each meeting, taking just a couple of minutes for each committee to report. In other clubs, committees are keeping tally so that a collation for each reporting period is Resulting from feedback after the first set of reports were submitted, the form has been revised in the hope that it will be easier clearer for clubs to use in the future. Area Directors will again work with clubs on the next round with the revised form.

Please remember that the second quarterly report (September to November 2006 figures) is due on 15 December. It should be sent to your Area Director and the District Governor.

Results from across the Zonta world

I have received a report from President Olivia Ferry thanking clubs for completing their first quarterly returns and highlighting the crucial need to identify and assess ZI's global efforts to advance the status of women. Livie noted that quite a number of clubs did not report the first time, but still the aver-

What happens to club reports? DG Explains....

Let me explain the process after club reports are submitted.

The District Governor provides to ZI a collation of all club reports, along with comments in response to a number of other questions from ZI. My report is sent to ZI Headquarters and to our ZI Board Liaison Bonny Schumacher who is in a position to report at the ZI board meeting on highlights and/or issues raised by the three Districts with which she liaises. Thus summaries and highlights from the entire Zonta world can be reported by all International Directors at ZI Board meetings.

Part of my report is a collation of the information clubs have submitted about service activities, hours, funds raised etc so that I can give a total picture for the District. I am asked to report to ZI on collaborative initiatives with other organisations; advocacy initiatives in which clubs have been involved; local and district service projects; funds raised and allocated; UN activities at club and Area level; membership; leadership activities and succession planning across the District; PR and Communication (e.g., percentage of members

registered with the ZI website and subscribed to the networking directory, number of clubs that have submitted stories to our PR & C Chairman Nan Martella for sending to *The Zontian* magazine, percentage of clubs with a website); report on District Board meeting/s held in the reporting period; details over time about selected club and district projects.

I believe that the information reported at District and International level will be of great value to clubs in service and advocacy, in promotion and credibility. As information is shared across the Zonta world, others will hear of the great work being done in District 23, and we in turn will learn and gain ideas from others.

With reports representing the contributions of clubs from the entire Zonta world, ZI will be able to measure the effectiveness of our organisation in meeting our biennial goals. It is hoped that more accurate information will be available for provision to agencies with which ZI might be interested in working on service projects. There is also significant scope for writing hard hitting media releases when we are in a position to more accurately quantify hours of service, lives affected and impact on the community.

Area 1: Frances Quinn Arts Encouragement Award - 21 years on

Since 1986, the Zonta Club of Melbourne Yarra and now Melbourne on Yarra, has combined with the Victorian College of the Arts (VCA) School of Music to

recognise the most talented and promising first year female student.

On Sunday 22nd October 2006, the 21st annual Frances Quinn Arts Encouragement Award (the Award) was presented to Kay Chim, a talented young pianist.

Kay attained her Associate Diploma in 2002 during which time she won 15 first and second place awards. In 2004, Kay was awarded her Licentiate Diploma with Distinction and won first place in the under 25 Open Section for a piano solo at the Ringwood Eisteddfod. Kay Chim is a worthy recipient of the Award for 2006 and certainly a name to remember!

The late Frances Quinn was a very popular member of the

former Zonta Club of Melbourne Yarra and a great lover of music and the performing arts. The Frances Quinn Arts Encouragement Award was established in her honour and encourages young women to follow a career

path that complements their musical talents, in a way that Fran would greet with much delight.

The Award is presented annually in October at a concert featuring performances by the current winner and prior year winners. Given the diverse talents of the winners, each concert is a unique and enlightening experi-

ence. The concert is followed by refreshments, an opportunity to meet the performers and of course, the customary raffle. The ongoing support of the Quinn

their careers gaining acclaim in Australia and abroad. These include the first winner, Caroline Almonte, now an internationally recognised pianist and Shannon Barnett, who plays the trombone with the likes of Don Burrows, composes her own works and backed Camille O'Sullivan at the 2006 Melbourne International

Arts Festival.

To celebrate 21 years of the Award, and the achievements of previous winners, the Zonta Club of Melbourne on Yarra launched the 'Quintessential Collection' CD at the 2006 Award concert with recitals by Shannon Barnett (2001 winner) and Christa Jardine (2005 winner), who both perform on the CD. The CD also features performances by Lauren Oldham (2002 winner), who sang the anthems at the opening ceremony of the Zonta International Convention in Melbourne in June.

The group has organised the Premier's Service Club Awards each year. It is also responsible for the Awards Presentation Dinner and the Lord Mayor's Reception held during Service Club Week each year.

The Premier's Awards Presentation Dinner was held during Service Club Week 2006, on Tuesday 10th October, in Adelaide.

This year the Premier of SA extended the prizes greatly with \$2000 for the best entry in any

category and \$500 for winners in all other categories.

It was a great night for Zonta as

- Adelaide Hills won the Catalyst Award for the project which provided the best catalyst between Clubs and Public

 Adelaide Flinders won the award for Women's Health for their work at Katherine House (\$500)

The Adelaide Club was the runner-up in this award.

This year was the inaugural award of the Community Service Medal - named the Heide Taylor Medal honouring Heide for her many years of unpaid community work. This was won by Julie Lowe, nominated by the Zonta Club of Port Lincoln.

The Schools Project Award was presented by the Lord Mayor at the Mayoral Reception the following morning. It is an award for a project involving a school and a Service Club with a prize of \$1000. Adelaide Club was the Service Club associated with Adelaide High School who shared the School's prize for forming a school service club in the community.

New UN International Women's Agency

The following was forwarded by Louise Van Keulen, D23 UN Coordinator, and no doubt we'll be hearing more about this exciting new agency as it develops:

'If you've been following the course of UN reform, the news is out. The Highlevel Panel named by Secretary-General Kofi Annan has reported and it recommends the creation of an *independent, international women's agency*, for the first time in the UN's history.

From the Toronto Star report, 10 November: 'A landmark proposal for creating a powerful new United Nations women's agency moved a giant step closer to reality yesterday, with the endorsement of a high-level panel on reforming the sprawling UN system.

"This is the most dramatic step forward in decades, for women and for the UN," said Stephen Lewis, the UN special envoy on AIDS/HIV, who has lobbied vigorously for an agency that would deliver programs and services to billions of women throughout the world on an unprecedented scale.'
