Dear Zontians,
Club Reports

Thanks to clubs for sending your compre-

hensive reports to your Area Director and to me throughout the biennium to date so that information about what is happening in District 23 can be forwarded to ZI – please be assured that my report, which includes a collation of all that is sent by clubs, is read by every member of the ZI Board and by the Chairmen of all ZI Committees.

There are just two more for the biennium, with number 5 due on **31 December**.

I have had a couple of enquiries about the format to be used. I am grateful for whatever information is sent, but request that if possible, clubs use the revised format on the ZI website (under club administration, the proforma is club quarterly report with fellowship V2 January 2007. With the formatting there is the capacity to provide details of (only) eight projects or activities. If a club has more than eight, I suggest you use a second form with just the extra activities detailed on that.

Please remember that your Area Director receives several reports and I receive (hopefully) 38. It is extremely helpful when clubs include their club name in the file name so that there is no need for re-naming when received. If there is the need to use a second form for a greater number of activities, please identify it as *clubname2*.

Please note that with the change to fewer reports, there is no club report due in March as on the original list sent to clubs, BUT I need to change the date for the final report for the biennium. My DG report is due to ZI on 25 May, and to ensure that Area Directors have adequate time to collate reports, then I in turn provide a comprehensive report to ZI, I ask that clubs have their final report for the biennium submitted to Area Directors and to me by 25 April.

Visit to ZC The Riverland

It is well known that a number of clubs beyond Melbourne celebrate the Melbourne Cup in a special way. My Cup Day was spent well away from the scene of the race at the ZC of The Riverland. What a treat that evening was! Traditionally, members do something to celebrate the event, and this year's focus was hats. For those who did not coming wearing one, there was a solution,

Membership and Meetings

In 1983 Stephen Baker wrote a book titled, *I Hate Meetings* which he described as a tongue in cheek guide for the upwardly mobile in business. In this book he addresses matters such as:

- if a meeting accomplishes nothing, why have them at all
- how to look like an authority even when you are not
- how to act organised when you are not
- what to do when you don't understand the situation
- creating the right atmosphere
- what every chairperson should know about people at the meeting.

Zonta is about having meetings and I would like to raise some pointers for you to consider for your own meetings (in light of the above points). In The ZI Membership Goals for the 2006 - 2008 biennium one of the actions is: Promote stimulating informative club meetings while still following meeting procedure. It is the responsibility of all clubs and Area Directors to ensure that this action happens and the goal is met. Section 5 of your club manual is all about Zonta meetings and I refer you this document. Let's return to the dot points above.

Why have a meeting?

The purpose of a meeting is to conduct club business. Where do you have your meetings? Is the venue appropriate for the meeting you are having? Is it costing too much for the meal? If you have always had your meetings at the same place is it time for a change, just for one meeting? Is there an order of business that is communicated to members so that they can follow the meeting? Is correct parliamentary procedure followed? Do you have a copy of the parliamentary authority for reference at club meetings? Do you

have a designated parliamentarian to advise your president? If you have answered yes to all these questions, well done. If you have answered no, you have some work to do.

Meetings should be informative, fun and allow time at the meetings for fellowship, talking to friends and especially getting to know new members. You should have a yearly calendar of meetings planned that take into account Zonta events e.g. Amelia Earhart, biennium/mid-biennium dinners, International Women's Day and International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. Appropriate speakers can be sourced for these meetings. This planning meeting should occur in May/June when there is a new

Being in authority, i.e. the president's role

A member of my club at Adelaide Flinders reminded me when I was elected as president some years ago; The President Presides - not decides. I heeded these words from an older, wiser member the whole time I was president. Presidents play a key leadership role in Zonta and communication is important. Information from and to ZI must be communicated to members. The president will bring her own personality to the position and this must be respected. The responsibilities of the president can be found in the club handbook. The president needs to know procedure and have a close liaison with chairs of committees. They need to have tact and tenacity.

Are you organised?

Is the club organised with meeting procedure? Agendas, minutes, physical preparation before the meeting (seating, audio visual equipment, flags, gavel, gifts for speakers etc) need to be well organised. Do you have a roster for grace, objects of Zonta and the

raffle if you have one and does the member know well before the meeting that she will be expected to participate? Does your club have a member or small group to plan meetings and speakers at meetings in collaboration with the board? Sharing responsibilities around can give members a taste of leadership. It can also provide the opportunity for a member to demonstrate their Zonta talent.

P.S. Don't forget to consult with the Area Director as to when she would like to program her visit. This needs to be once in the biennium

Don't understand?

For long standing members of Zonta we sometimes take for granted that everyone at the meeting is 'on the same page'. This may not be the case. Newer members may not understand some of the things that happen at meetings and it is up to us to ensure that they are fully aware. This means that when you induct a new member please get someone to mentor them and go through the history of Zonta, ZI, the District and the area. Make sure everyone understands – even quests.

Creating the right atmosphere

For some people this is easy and for others it needs work. Make sure that there is a welcoming person at the door every time you meet. If you are expecting a big crowd then there needs to be more then one person. Ensure that guests are taken or directed to their seats and that there is someone to speak with them. Do not leave a guest or new member alone. Do not have heavy debate on controversial matters when speakers/visitors are present—this is a sure put off.

What everyone should know about people at the meeting

Everyone brings to the meeting her own personality and agenda.

It is important that you know what these are.

Do you have members who are steeped in long established traditions and do not want to change? Respect this and move on.

There needs to be a close relationship of members within a club to be a good working club. Facilitate an environment in which all ideas are valued. All members need to become skilled in handling the difficult member at a meeting. As Baker wrote in his book – no one must shout, scream, howl, or bellow – at least not until all other modes of communicating have already been exhausted.

While the president is ultimately responsible for the meeting, it may be you, the member, who can intervene and defuse a potentially bad experience.

While the above is not exhaustive I hope that it has given you some food for thought about your meetings. Take a few moments at your next Board meeting to reflect and identify any areas that you could improve. Good luck with your future energetic, vibrant, vivacious meetings!

'Earth Matters' to Melbourne on Yarra



Dr Anne Sibbel gives good advice to Melbourne on Yarra members

The Zonta Club of Melbourne on Yarra organised a seminar on climate change, on Saturday, 27 October, at which Dr Anne Sibbel revealed that in 2006, 6% of children in Australia were from families that could not afford to buy food once supplies were depleted. This unhappy scenario could get worse as food prices escalate due to the impacts of climate change.

In her presentation on food security, Dr Sibbel, Senior Lecturer School of Applied Science at RMIT University, explained that food security was threatened when families cannot afford to buy food, or accessible food is nutritionally unbalanced or inadequate. As the drought impacts the production of


fruit and vegetables, with the inevitable increases in prices, both these factors will be evident. This can lead to long term health problems, as evidenced by the incidence of obesity being 20-40% higher in women experiencing food insecurity compared with trends in other developed countries.

Melbourne on Yarra organised the breakfast seminar on climate change to present the issues at a human level. Other speakers included, MairiAnne Mackenzie, a farmer and conservationist, who discussed the problems arising from shortage of water on the types of crops we are going to be able to grow and therefore the impact on our diet.

Mike O'Connell, immediate past president of the Alternative Technology Association focussed on practical solutions within the home that would cut down our use of energy and greenhouse emissions.

Any surplus from the seminar will be donated to the Ardoch Youth Foundation, with whom Melbourne on Yarra has had a long association. Julie Hilton, Community Education Coordinator at Ardoch, spoke about the work of the Foundation in making education a reality for young people including those experiencing homelessness or poverty.

Area 1: Longest serving Zontian turns ninety

Jean Hagger, now the longest serving member of an Australian Zonta Club, celebrated her 90th Birthday at the

October meeting of the Zonta Club of Melbourne on Yarra.

Head of the Department of Librarianship at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology, Jean was the first woman to head a Department at that institution. She tells how she was beavering away in her office at the end of the 1965 academic year when she received a visit from the legendary Dorothy Thompson on her mission to establish Zonta Clubs in Australia and New Zealand. Not a person to join Clubs and Associations, Jean "got rid of" Dorothy by giving her names of possible recruits. Within a short time, Dorothy was back in person to report that these women had committed themselves to joining Zonta. Jean's reaction was "If they are interested,

there must be something in this Zonta", whereupon she, too, committed herself to Zonta. She has never regretted her decision.

Now the only remaining Charter member of the Zonta Club of Melbourne on Yarra, the first Club to be chartered in 1966, Jean is the longest serving member of any Zonta Club in Australia.

Jean has served Zonta well. Past President, Secretary, Director, Archivist and Life Member of our Club and a regular participant in the Victorian Past Presidents' Group, she was until recently a member of the District History and Archives Committee.

Jean is well-known to the wider Zonta world through her regular attendance at District Conferences, International Conventions and visits to Clubs during her many travels. Those of us privileged to be a co-member of the Zonta Club of Melbourne on Yarra, appreciate her extensive knowledge of Zonta, her wisdom, her forthright manner and her keen sense of humour.

Happy 90th birthday, Jean, and may there be many more!

Pakistan operated by RAWA (the Revolutionary Association of the Women of Afghanistan).

A2 Clubs were touched by the story of a young girl at the school and collectively donated \$2240 to go to SAWA Australia, the Australia-based Support Association for the Women of Afghanistan. Unfortunately, between the time that we received Melinda's e-mail and getting some funds together the Pakistani government forced the closure of Afghan refugee camps and RAWA was under great strain to assist the refugees in the attempts to resettle into life in war-torn Afghanistan so we were advised our "very timely" contribution would go towards RAWA's emergency relief effort. In August I attended the SA Rural Women's Gathering at Clare. Area 2 clubs had become major sponsors by donating \$1500 to assist drought affected women to attend the conference. The Clare Zonta Club was asked to set up a Zonta display showcasing the Breast Cushions and Birthing Kits. I was given a two minute speaking opportunity and from this and the display, interest was show in setting up two new clubs. Lt. Gov Pauline Glover has followed this up and has already visited Bordertown and has a trip to Mt Gambier planned for the New Year.

Millicent Hughes is not only the coordinator of the Area 2 Combined Status of Women Committee (CSOWC) but is also the Area 2 representative on the Association of Community Service Organisations (ACSO). Both these committees have had a very busy time and thanks go to Millicent for her commitment and input. A very successful seminar "Domestic Violence –

Community Action" was held in October with four excellent speakers discussing various aspects of community action for the management of domestic violence. The recent ACSO Premier's Community Service Awards dinner was very well attended by A2 Zontians and Zonta won the Team Award for the Breast Cushion Project. The Adelaide Club was a finalist in the Women's Health Award.

Around the Clubs

Most clubs have been involved in Birthing Kit assembly days, breast cushion workshops, meetings with an international theme, are planning fun based meetings to end the year and have inducted, or are planning to induct, new members.

Adelaide: 25 members participated in a Spring Walk for UNIFEM where almost \$400 was raised. A civic reception for Women of Achievement Awards,

hosted by the Lord Mayor of Adelaide was held at the Adelaide Town Hall.

Adelaide Flinders continues to hold very successful XYZ (eXtend Your Zonta) functions for fun and fellowship. The most recent were attending the movie "Jammed" and a guided tour of the "Freestyle" exhibition followed by lunch at the Art Gallery Café.

Adelaide Hills' members and guests arrived in international dress for their International Night where there was a guest speaker from Africa representing the African Women's Association in Adelaide and two teenage girls from Sudan and Afghanistan. The club coordinated the Zonta walkers in the City to Bay Walk held whilst many of us were at Conference. The team looked resplendent in their yellow T-shirts – another great PR exercise.

Adelaide Torrens had a meeting with a difference - an Indonesian cooking class. Gardasil and Cervarix were the topic of a talk by a member of the club, Assoc. Professor Marg Davy, Director of Gynaecological Oncology, Royal Adelaide Hospital.

Alice Springs provided assistance at the Alice Springs Breast Cancer Golf Day where over 100 participants became aware of the Zonta Club in Alice Springs. Together with members of the Z Club they raised over \$1600 selling fruit salad at the Old Timers Fete. Alice Springs Z Club mem-

bers have made and donated 12 new gowns to the Alice Springs Hospital for premature babies.

Clare hosted a very successful CSOWC meeting held with seven clubs represented by 23 Zontians. Two young guest speakers spoke on Domestic Violence and the provision of safe houses.

Fleurieu's focus has been on promoting Zonta through displays at several shows. Judy Steele AO spoke at the International night on her work in Uganda and the distribution of birthing kits.

Gawler and Barossa have made a commitment to increased networking within the community and Area 2. They have participated in a wide range of mission focused projects ranging from two members sleeping in cardboard boxes at the Gawler Community House Sleep Rough event to raise funds for a Christmas Lunch for homeless and others who, for geographical, health or other reasons, have no close family and friends, to attending Minister for Status of Women, Jennifer Rankine's

Area 3 clubs gathered in Bunbury on the 10th November for their annual Founders' Day Dinner and presentation of the Area 3 Woman of Achievement Award. Members were able to socialise and network as they were provided with delectable 'networking entreés', before sitting down to the main course.

Perth Club's nominee, Martha Teshome, was announced as this year's Area 3 Woman of Achievement and following is the citation outlining Martha's outstanding achievements.

Martha has accumulated 14 years of community related work experience in Ethiopia (East Africa) before migrating to Western Australia 18 years ago. Martha is currently the Community Education Officer (Female Genital Mutilation - FGM) at Child and Community Health, Women's and Children's Health Service.

Much of Martha's work since migrating, has been in community health and she has also worked in a voluntary capacity with the Unity of Ethiopians in WA Inc. and community radio.

In her current paid position Martha provides education and awareness to effect change through:

- Training health professionals;
- Educating migrant services of the FGM issues affecting newly arrived migrants and refugees;

- Liaising with migrant services to sustain government funding and interest;
- Liaising with international organisations to access relevant research, campaigns and other materials and programs to deal with FGM issues;
- Developing specialised education sessions for men and religious leaders to de-stigmatize FGM as a women's issue that is culture specific;
- Ensuring educational materials are available in multiple languages; and
 - Revising and updating existing education materials.

Martha was instrumental in establishing two community-based Ethiopian radio programs through 6EBA-FM World Radio and she contributed to the program as producer and broadcaster for two years (2001 and 2002) in a voluntary capacity. She currently produces and broadcasts in an hour-long Amharic Radio Program every Sunday on 103.3 FM.

Martha has also worked as an African Community Worker to assist migrants through the settlement process on arrival in Western Australia and this work includes:

- Arranging English classes;
- · Finding employment;
- Arranging health check-ups;
- Dealing with culture shock and adjustment issues, such as marital problems; and alcohol and drug abuse;
- Finding permanent housing;
 and
- Linking migrants with services and infrastructure which fulfil cultural needs, such as where to shop for ingredients for traditional foods.

For the past nine years in her role as a Community Education Officer, Martha has developed skills and expertise specific to FGM. In this role Martha has advocated for a specific law to be passed to make FGM illegal.

She has formed partnerships with other service agencies and international organisations including the Zonta Club of Perth and Soroptimists International. Martha has implemented FGM protocols for service delivery. She has also developed many translated resources to be used for community education. She is a passionate advocate for the rights of women and children.

Martha has played an important role in educating doctors, midwives and health care workers about FGM and has made a large contribution to health education programs for health care and community workers. She is largely responsible for a change in community attitudes to FGM amongst migrant communities which practise it.

Martha generously gives of her own time to be involved with the community in raising awareness about FGM. She has a huge commitment and drive to work on an important women's health issue.

Membership


I am particularly heartened to note the increasing skill and suc-

Calling all Zonta Clubs!

All clubs will have received the October PR&C E-News from Erlinda E. Panlilio, Chairman, ZI Public Relations & Communications Committee who has called for all clubs to be a part of Convention 2008 in Rotterdam as it celebrates Zonta's Local Service in Action. In keeping with the Convention theme, "Global Empowerment Through Local Action," all Zonta clubs are invited to submit photos of their service and advocacy projects that focus on Zonta's mission of advancing the status of women. "Local Service in Action," a PowerPoint presentation of these photos, will be shown 15 minutes prior to the start of each business session.

Following are the criteria from Erlinda:

- 1. A club may submit a maximum of three photos: two of its service projects and one of an advocacy initiative. Photos must be action shots, pictures that tell a story, rather than posed photos of Zontians at their project, smiling at the camera. Photos should be clear and sharp; use the best-quality settings on your digital camera. Send the photos in jpeg format attached to an Email to zontaintl.pr@gmail.com. In your covering Email, put the corresponding caption for each photo, identifying which caption goes with which photo. The caption must describe the action in the picture in no more than 20 words, and include the name of your club and your district number.
- Photos must relate to one of Zonta's goals for advancing the status
 of women-- Improving women's: a) health, b) education, c) legal
 rights, d) economic self-sufficiency, e) self-esteem; and f) preventing
 violence against women.
- Deadline for submission of all photos is 1 March 2008. (Please submit early to avoid congestion in the email box. Please do not wait until the last month.)

A special Task Force under our ZI PR & C Committee will select the photos to be included in the PowerPoint presentation, and may edit captions. Those photos that do not conform to the above criteria will not be included. By submitting photos, it is understood that the club abides by these criteria.
