I wonder how many of you have heard of the Australian Women's Coalition (AWC)? I had heard of it but did not know much about it until recently. The AWC is a national coalition of women's non-government organisations. The AWC's mission is to work collaboratively to advance the status of women by: increasing communication within the women's sector; clearly identifying the needs of women represented by the partners of the coalition; initiating policies, programs and partnerships to address these needs; and advocating on women's issues to government and the community. Zonta was originally represented nationally by District 24. Through negotiations over the past weeks District 23 is now a member in its own right. As most of the meetings are held in Sydney, Sharyl Scott from District 24, who has been the Zonta representative on the AWC for four years, has accepted to be the delegate for District 23, with myself or nominated representative as alternate. The great news is that at the AGM held recently Sharyl was elected President of the AWC which is great for Zonta. I am sure that over the coming months you will hear much more about the work of the AWC and how we can become involved. When speaking of our association with the AWC Sharon says "I believe that Zontians need to see their work will be of greater significance, even from a community effort, if they can link it with the bigger picture of working for women's rights in Australia".

Ensure that all applicants use the 2011 version. There have been a few changes to the eligibility criteria. These changes are outlined below:

- Applicants must be 16-19 years old:
- Applicants must be living or studying in a Zonta district or region at the time of application;

Applicants must also demonstrate evidence of the following:

- Experience in local or student government;
- Knowledge of Zonta
- International and its Programs;
- Advocating on behalf of ZI's mission to advance the status of women worldwide.

In order for more women to be represented in key decision making positions worldwide, we must encourage young women to pursue careers or seek leadership positions in public policy making, government and volunteer organisations and further their education with these aims in mind

Public affairs refer to all aspects of community life where decisions have to be made about issues which relate to and affect those communities in which the applicant works and lives.

At Club level the YWPA program offers opportunities to generate publicity that promotes the Club, District 23 and Zonta International as an organization committed to programs that work to advance the status of women.

# Status of Women Service

Service Committee members have been communicating through email to develop an action plan for the 2010-2012 biennium which will shortly be submitted to the District Governor and Board for endorsement. The purpose of the plan is to ensure that the committee's work is consistent with the requirements outlined by Zonta International and the International and District biennium goals.

One of the actions proposed is the compilation of a register of service activities undertaken by clubs in District 23. I have been able to identify some service activities through club newsletters but of course not all clubs publish newsletters. Once the action plan has been endorsed by the District Board I will be asking Area Directors to assist in populating the register with service activities when they meet or communicate with their Club Presidents. I know clubs are keen to keep reporting requirements simple, so there will be no mandatory reporting, but rather clubs will be encouraged to email details of their service activities. The register will then, in turn, be forwarded to clubs at regular intervals so that ideas may be shared.

The Service Committee consists of members who coordinate the various awards such as Young Women in Public Affairs (YWPA), Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarships, Amelia Earhart Fellowship. Zonta International Strategies to Eradicate Violence against Women (ZISVAW) and Z Clubs and Golden Z Clubs. Each Co-ordinator is keen to hear from clubs interested in participating in these important activities and their contact details are available in the District Directory 2010-2012. I would also urge your club, when making contributions to Zonta International Foundation, to keep these awards in mind

Together with Pauline Glover, (Adelaide Flinders) and Jasmine Koch (Melbourne on Yarra) I had the opportunity to visit the Ninety Nines Inc. museum at Oklahoma City Airport following convention. Amelia Earhart was a founding member and first President of this organisation of women pilots. Amelia's early flying achievements are a highlight of the museum including a detailed account, together with photographs, of her ill-fated flight across the Pacific in 1937.

Amelia left Lae in Papua/New Guinea on 2 July, 1937, and went missing. Her remains and the debris of her plane have never been recovered. In her role as President, Amelia was known for her support and advancing the cause of women in aviation. It was Amelia's suggestion that the organisation's name be based on the number of charter members; there were ninety nine. Also featured in the museum are two

well known Australian aviators, viz. Nancy-Bird Walton, who was Australia's first female pilot and Gaby Kennard, who flew solo around the world. The museum is certainly worth a visit if you are in Oklahoma City.

We visited Ethiopia in late July and found the project in Afar, run by Valerie Browning, working brilliantly. The Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital, where many of our kits currently go, is looking at options to produce their own kits. We also discussed local production with Ruth Kennedy in Tigray Province (north) and the Ministry of Health (MOH), which plans to use our kit as their model.

Dr Luc from Congo came up to Addis to see us and is also getting local production going under our guidance and with our support.

The Birthing Kit Foundation has been accepted for the Hunter Hall Charitable Scheme. The scheme allows shareholders a vote to donate a percentage of the profits to charity. If you own shares, please vote for us when the papers come out in the next few months.

Jenny Weaver and Joy O'Hazy attended the United Nations Department of Public Information Non-**Government Organisations** Conference in Melbourne last month on Advance Global Health. It was a shame Zonta was not represented there in its own right.

We learnt a lot about human rights, comprehensive primary health and the importance of high quality education is the basis of a good health care system.

## District 23 Zontians at UN Conference.

'Advance Global Health: Achieve the Millennium Development Goals' was the title of the 63<sup>rd</sup> Annual United Nations Department of Public Information / Non-**Governmental Organizations** Conference, held in Melbourne from 30 August to 1 September 2010. The Conference examined some of the critical issues that support or hinder achievement of these goals through four 'Roundtable' presentations and 55 'workshops'. A consistent theme was that the most successful projects are those that are initiated within the community in which they are based and directly engage community members, creating learning opportunities and ensuring long term impact. While each annual DPI/NGO conference

has a different theme, the focus on health issues was well suited to active participation by Zonta International. Cooperation between the UN and Non-

Government Organizations (NGOs) is exemplified by Zonta's project partnerships with UNIFEM and UNFPA. Despite attempts by Zonta's UN Chairman Mary Ann Tarantula, and further attempts within Australia, it was not possible to arrange formal Zonta representation at the conference. However, District 23 Zontians Beryl McMillan and Ronda Walker gained last minute registration through the Australian Women's Coalition and Joy O'Hazy and Jenny Weaver represented the Birthing Kit Foundation. Our AWC representative Sharyl Scott (District 24) attended as part of the AWC delegation.

A declaration endorsed by Conference delegates was presented to the UN Meeting held in New York in September, calling on all governments, agencies, NGOs, corporations and individuals to deliver on their human rights obligations to over a billion people living in poverty, by committing the finances and political will necessary to achieve the MDGs, set in 2005, by 2015.

### Young Women Speak Out at the World Youth Conference!



Young activists from around the world convened at the Young Women's Forum in August, held during the 5<sup>th</sup> World Youth Conference in León, Mexico. Sponsored by UNIFEM, the forum involved a day of panels on issues such as technology, peace building and ending violence against women. The forum was capped by a rousing final concert attended by 3.000 people.

At the concert, a series of singers rallied support for the UN Secretary-General's UNITE to End Violence against Women campaign. Performers included Debi Nova, a Costa Rican singer based in the United States; G-Town, a hip-hop group of three Palestinian youths; and Pambo, a Mexican singer. The acts had diverse musical styles, and performed in English, Arabic and Spanish. But they shared the same message: It's time to end violence against women and girls.

"I decided to support the UNITE campaign because violence against women is a basic violation of human rights," said Debi Nova in an interview at the forum. "When women are going through that it is very difficult to come out and speak. Programmes like this can really help women come out of their prisons.

She pointed out that gender violence is something she has personally experienced. "So I didn't have a doubt that I wanted to use my voice to help eradicate this problem. We're not alone. We all go through hard times. We're strong women and we can get through it.'

Inés Alberdi, the UNIFEM Executive Director, and Nadine Gasman, the Director of the UNITE campaign for Latin America and the Caribbean, delivered opening remarks at the concert, stressing the need to empower youth in the fight against genderbased violence.

# Yarri Wada Project Update

#### **Zonta Club of Perth**

#### Lotterywest funding sees Kimberley Project Continue!

A huge thank you goes to all the Zonta Clubs in District 23 that supported the Yarri Wada Project in the last biennium. In recent months, the funds have been matched by the Unity of First People of Australia and a Project Manager has been employed to see the continuation of the education programs commenced as part of the Yarri Wada Puppet Project.

Meanwhile Yarri Wada Project Coordinators Fiona Crowe and Sciona Browne, applied for funding to continue the programs and have been waiting to hear if they have been successful... It is now official – Lotterywest has granted \$230,307 to ensure the work continues for two more years.

The project will move forward under the name 'ILERLA' - meaning 'young youth'. It targets young people in the remote Kimberley region of Western Australia who live in environments where there are high levels of alcohol abuse, drug abuse and violence. Ilerla will be administered by the Unity of First People of Australia and the Zonta Club of Perth will continue to be involved through representation on the Community Reference Group

to whom the Project Manager reports. In addition, the club will also assist with seeking funding to sustain the program beyond the next two years. *Ilerla* brings together community elders and a host of local organizations and government agencies such as True Blue Dreaming, Rainbow Program, WA Police, WA Health Department, Curtin University, University of South Australia, Kimberley Aboriginal Medical Services, Aboriginal Healthwork, Mooditi, Standby Me, Nunga Women's Workshops, St John Ambulance and many more! Mowunjum resident, Leah Umbagai, will coordinate a range of programs aimed at children, youth, young adults, young parents, mothers, fathers and grandparents. The *Ilerla* **Project** is based at Mowunjum (10km south of Derby) but will also include communities on the Gibb River Road up to 500km away.

With talks by indigenous role models, professional assistance to deal with emotional and physical trauma and after school activities such as art workshops, drop in centre for homework, puppet theatre activities, in-country camps, traditional dance afternoons and a 'kids club' that incorporates a sleep-over from Friday

night for those children who are unsafe at home on weekends. children will have opportunities to broaden their thinking and be empowered to make good decisions for the future. Additional programs designed to help youth navigate puberty more safely include high school sex education programs, as so many of the 15-18 year olds are at high risk of unplanned pregnancy, sexually transmitted infections and breakdown in mental health. The Kimberlev Land Council will also take boys and girls on a bush training program to show them how to monitor the environment and animals and manage the country using traditional techniques such as controlled



burning. The whole community will be touched by *Ilerla*.

Melbourne on Yarra led the way with their very successful "Planning for a Healthy Future" breakfast seminar where over one hundred women listened to keynote speaker Professor Helena Teede from the Jean Hailes Foundation discuss the vast problems associated with obesity and diabetes within our female population.
