Sonia Ziaee, the nomination from the Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders Inc., has been selected as this year's District 23 winner of the Jane M Klausman Women in Business Scholarship. She is currently studying in the third year of a Degree in Commerce, majoring in Accounting, at the Flinders University of South Australia. She plans to continue with her studies next year and do her MBA specializing in International Relations.

Originally from Kabul in Afghanistan, Sonia has embraced the opportunities and challenges presented by her life at an Australian university. She has maintained a high academic standard

while at the same time, volunteering her time and expertise with the Flinders University Afghan Union, the Association of Australian Tertiary Students from Afghanistan and the Support Association for Women of Afghanistan. Her growing profile has seen her give presentations at various events, most recently being a panel member on the ABC's Big Ideas "Intelligence Squared Debate" on the topic: "There is no justification for risking Australian lives in Afghanistan." She is motivated is to learn about the "various manifestations of Islam in western countries and exploring ways of fostering positive interactions between Muslims, Christians and other faiths."

Trained in computers and networking, she has previously been involved in teaching women computer skills through the Ministry of Women's Affairs in Kabul, enabling them to engage in the work force, to realize their potential as women and to build sustainable futures for themselves.

Sonia also works for an Afghan private logistics company (through internet and email) which enables her to support her family in Afghanistan and be actively engaged in the business world.

Some of her formative years were spent with her family in a refugee environment in Pakistan, from which experience Sonia has been imbued with the passion to succeed and the belief in the power of women to play their role in achieving peaceful solutions to the world's problems.

Congratulations to Sonia – her application forms will now be sent to Zonta International for consideration for one of the twelve ZI awards.

There were 6 nominations received from the district this year, which was very pleasing – thank you to Area 1, ZC Adelaide Flinders Inc. in Area 2, Area 3 and the ZC Bendigo Inc. and Melton Inc. in Area 4 and Area 5 for supporting this award.

### Legislative Awareness & Advocacy

In this edition I would like to remind all members that we have a commitment to the Millennium Development Goals. The following information has been taken from the Millennium Development Goals Report 2011 and this can be accessed online through the UN website.

Ban Ki Moon, Secretary General, United Nations says that 'between now and 2015, we must make sure that promises made become promises kept'. There have been inroads made already with people being lifted out of poverty, lives saved and children attending school.

While all the goals are important there are some that are very relevant to Zonta and our mission. Goal 4, to reduce child mortality has had some success. Globally the mortality rate for children under 5 has declined by a third, from 89 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1990 to 60 in 2009. A startling statistic is that 12,000 fewer children are dying today than in 1990. Children who are poor and hardest to reach still lack access to lifesaving measles vaccines. While the number of child deaths due to measles has fallen shortfalls in funding puts continued success in jeopardy.

Goal 5 Improving maternal health is one that I am passionate about. Being a midwife I have the privilege of sharing an amazing time in the life of a woman and her family. In Australia we have amazing choice for women and their pregnancy and birthing care. and while we know that not every baby will be born alive, the death of a baby at birth is rare. In the developing countries, maternal mortality remains a major burden. Maternal deaths, on the whole, are avoidable. Many of the deaths are caused by haemorrhage, eclampsia (fitting because of high blood pressure), infection, complications of unsafe abortions and

indirect causes such as malaria and HIV. The presence of a trained health care worker at the delivery is crucial in reducing maternal deaths. In 2010 myself and Jodi Knoop, president of the Zonta Club of Adelaide Flinders, had the privilege of going with a team of 6 midwives to Cambodia to train 370 traditional and skilled birth attendants. This was an amazing experience to be in the village where these birth attendants live and work. In hot, cramped and basic classrooms we were able to discuss how to prevent haemorrhage, how to treat shock from blood loss, how to safely manage a birth and advice on contraception. Going to Cambodia with 800 condoms in our suitcase was cause for much laughter!

We know that many women do not have access to antenatal care. In Australia women have 10 or more visits, but in rural areas in developing countries they are lucky to have one visit. There is the problem of adolescent girls and an unmet need for contraception with inadequate support for family planning. Reaching this group as a target population is crucial. Jodi and I will be speaking about our experiences in Cambodia at the conference in October. We have been so touched by the difference that we have made that we have both signed up to go back to Cambodia in October for more teaching. This is advocacy in action for us and while we are fortunate to have the skills and knowledge to do this work, I would like to ask you all to consider how you too could make a difference to meet the MDGs. While I have provided a synopsis of only 2 goals I urge you to get the report and have a read. It is easy reading and we know that continued progress requires an active commitment by all. This is an LAA and UN goal and therefore worthy of our attention.

# Status of Women Service Jill Taylor

Why does Zonta International still remain relatively unknown?

I am still amazed that so many women in our communities do not know about Zonta. This begs the question – why?
I think the simple answer is that women have a tendency to quietly

women have a tendency to quietly go about their business without any fanfare. However, whilst this assists the communities we serve it does not widely promote our activities. That is not to say that from time to time our efforts are not recognised publicly. However, it seems that public recognition is easier to achieve in smaller communities than larger cities. But we cannot accept that as a fact and not do anything about it.

But the answer is not a simple one - the challenge is for all clubs to spend some time on examining innovative ways of publicising Zonta International, what is stands for and what it delivers to the community. Additionally, the message should go out that new members are needed in order to continue our valuable work. This may require a multi-facetted approach – one size doesn't fit all.

Perhaps one area clubs could consider is facilitating the establishment of a Z Club or Golden Z Club. Coordinator, Phillipa Challis would be happy to discuss the process with you. Belonging to a Z or Golden Z Club introduces Zonta to a wide circle of young women and girls. Not only has that, maybe these girls have mothers, sisters and aunts who may be potential Zonta members.

When preparing agendas for minutes in the near future, perhaps you could list the establishment of a Z or Golden Z club for discussion.

National PR for the Zonta Birthing Kit Project: I have for many years heard numerous people, Zontians and others, lament that no one knows about our Zonta Birthing Kit Project. Well, we finally we broke onto the national stage last month with a "feel good" segment on the 7PM Project on Channel 10 on July 20. The producers wanted filming at an Assembly Day, some input from a midwife who had used the kits overseas, and interviews with some BKFA board members. It all came together after many emails, phone calls and over 2 hours of taping. The week previous I sent an email to the producers "Can I ask if at all possible if during the TV item if the support of over 100 Zonta clubs in Australia can be mentioned - as without their support there would not be a birthing kit project. They are the founding mothers and life blood of the project.'

The final draft was under the producers discretion and even though Zonta was mentioned numerous times in the interviews somehow it did not make the final cut. For our Zonta clubs I was disappointed, however, I

have been reassured there was a clear picture of the Zonta Logo on the bags.

For any organisation to get this level of exposure on National TV at prime time it was brilliant. The piece was well done. Carrie Bickmore added her own story to reiterate how without medical intervention she would have died after the birth of her son. The outcome of the segment was over 200 hundred emails received by our project administrator. Every email was answered and many wanted to fundraise - so the future will be excellent if we can appropriately harvest this enthusiasm. A PR package for those wanting to fundraise for us is being finalised and will soon be accessible on our website. We also received over \$5000 in donations. For those who missed the segment

The AWC works to improve the status of women through

advocacy, combining our resources and skills into a national response about issues our members have taken to heart. Now independent of the government's directives we are seeking corporate sponsorship and writing grants on issues important to members. This year we have:

\*Met with Federal Minister for Women Kate Ellis and Minister for Education Peter Garrett to discuss the issues members have raised about equality, youth leadership, multiculturalism and long term responses to sexual violence.

\*Submitted an application to the Human Rights Commission for a long term policy response to sexual violence in our community. This grant seeks funding to develop a holistic approach to the serious problem

affecting 1 in 4 women in our community. (Still waiting for announcement.)

\*Submitted a grant to Office for Women for a Young Women in Leadership grant involving an active approach to open dialogue and drama workshops between young women from culturally and linguistically diverse communities, rural communities and through 5 states and one territory.

\*Written to all Health ministers about the need for a systematic approach to assessing and treating fragility fractures. This has resulted in requests from WA and Queensland governments for AWC's recommendations supported by Dr John Eisman, Garvin Institute, to be included in draft submissions into their Health policies.

\*Invited to participate in the Australasian Conference of Women and Policing Conference, Hobart, 21 -24 August. Conference costs of approximately \$1000 have been

covered by the ACWAP. Vice President Jenny Begent (Social Services Manager of Salvation Army) will be delivering two papers on behalf of AWC. The theme of the conference is 'Making It Happen'. Jenny will be speaking on Young Women Offenders and the long term affects of sexual violence from legal perspectives. This important recognition of AWC follows a submission about young women indigenous offenders which was received and published by the Federal Government, February 2011. (www.acwap.com.au.)

\*Invited by Senator Michaella Cash to have input into what should be included in a policy for women. D23 suggestions including rural midwifery medical services, economic security and gender and equal opportunity were included.

I look forward to discussing issues important to D23 members when I meet you at the Melbourne conference in October.
