The Conference is the Annual General Meeting of District 23 where District officer bearers for the next biennium are elected, proposals to the ZI Bylaws and D23 Rules of Procedure are considered and reports are presented and accepted. It is a time to listen to inspiring guest speakers and join in workshops. It is also a time to renew old friendships, make new ones and have FUN.



After some discussion the motions put forward by Treasurer Carolyn Colquhoun were passed:

- The difference between the per capita International dues paid by clubs to the District for the current year, and the amount actually required (*due to the favourable* \$ *exchange rate*) will not be refunded to clubs.
- The District 23 per capita dues will rise by \$12 to \$40 per member per annum for 2012-13 and 2013-14.

The proposed changes to the District 23 Rules of Procedure as published in the Business Call to Conference papers, were also accepted with the exception of #5 which was withdrawn...

The summary of the evaluation forms has given some very positive feedback and some valuable suggestions for future conferences. (Report continues pages 2 & 3)

Heide Taylor passed away in September after a very courageous battle with cancer. She was known, not only in our District but throughout the Zonta world, as "Mother Zonta".

During her 42 years as a charter member of the Zonta Club of Adelaide she was instrumental in the establishment and sponsorship of 15 clubs in Area 2. She served for nearly ten years on the international scene and during this time 20 new countries joined Zonta International.

Heide Taylor was an exemplary Zontian who demonstrated an unwavering commitment to improving the lives of women throughout her life. She will be missed by her fellow Zontians in District 23 and remembered fondly by the entire Zonta International community. It was Heide's wish to not mourn her at a funeral but to celebrate her life at a champagne party. This" party" was organised for after the conference. About 80 Zontians and her friends got together to remember the good times. I was privileged to be asked to give a eulogy along with Heide's friend and Zontian Millicent Hughes. We have had only one President's meeting and that was kindly hosted by Vice Area 2 Director Anna Siebert in her home. There was general consensus to cancel our October meeting due to the number of competing Zonta events and we will meet for Xmas in my home.

The District conference was well attended by Area 2 with a number of first timers making the time and commitment to attend. My hope would be that they will also commit to attending the Perth conference and encourage another Zontian to go with them.

Birthing Kit Project—D23 Conference Presentation

I would recommend all members view the 7 PM Project film clip. Even though it was disappointing they did not mention our Zonta club involvement, this was an excellent piece of PR for the project. It resulted in over 200 email enquiries with many now holding fundraisers, and even Rio Tinto is holding an assembly day.

This week we reach the milestone of 900,000 kits being made. Our 1 millionth kit will happen next year.

Funding is a core issue for the Foundation. We have submitted our Base Accreditation with AusAID. This was a huge task. We won't know the outcome until 2012 and, if successful, may still not receive funding til 2013. You may not be aware that without AusAID funds, the Foundation has been subsidising the costs of the Birthing Kit Project as kits made in Australia cost more than \$2 to be delivered to their destination. We have therefore had to take the tough decision that, in order to keep kit production on an even keel, we cannot maintain \$2.00 kits after our 100,000 kits are booked.

From the start Zonta clubs have been SOLELY involved in the kit production aspect of the Foundation's work. Initially we only made and distributed kits. However, as the project has grown and developed over the years, we have recognised the importance of ensuring that changes to birthing practices are sustainable.

By supporting training programs and the production of birthing kits at the local level, we hope to achieve the greatest success – that kits are readily available locally and no longer needed from us.

To be a part of the TOTAL work of the

Foundation (that is kit production in Australia, training programs and in country kit production) and to reflect the true costs of the kits. All assembly day kits will cost \$3.00 once the initial 100,000 have been booked.

To help Zonta Clubs that might struggle with the higher price, the previous minimum of **600 kits** will now be reduced to lots of **200 kits**. If funding is an issue, we would prefer you to make fewer kits. We already have a Zonta club purposely booking \$3 kits (when \$2 kits are still available) because they want their donation to be fully self-funding and do more than just supply the kits. We hope that clubs will understand what we are trying to achieve.

With our Training programs we have trained over 8,500 Traditional Birth Attendants so far. We know that health outcomes for women and babies improve with training e.g. ending Female Genital Circumcision in Afar, Ethiopia. Many cultural habits were killing their women, for example, vertically cutting the umbilical cord after delivery to get rid of the bad blood. If the woman dies she had a lot of bad blood. "One Traditional Birth Attendant after training said it was like working with her eyes open for the first time." Education is the key. There is great demand for more training programs. Our focus will be in DR Congo, Kenya, Ethiopia and India.

With in-country kit production all is progressing well. Dr Luc produced 2000 local kits in DR Congo. With support from Rotary we are facilitating the production of 10,000 kits in Addis Ababa for the Hamlin Fistula Hospital. Funds have gone to Tigray Province in northern Ethiopia where disadvantaged women are getting employment and skills as they produce 2000 kits. Kits are regularly produced in Vietnam.

The Provincial Health Authorities in Ha Giang in northern Vietnam have agreed to take over kit production and supply in May 2013. It is the first such agreement we have completed and we're proud of having made such a lasting impact for the mainly tribal women of this border province. This is true sustainability – what we are aiming to achieve.

A highlight for the foundation is the wonderful news that Val Sarah has graciously accepted our invitation to be our first ambassador. I can think of no better representative for our birthing kit project.

Haven't we have come a long way? We can all stand back and be proud of our efforts; we are the biggest supplier of birthing kits in the world after UNFPA and UNICEF.

On behalf of the entire board, and from the women and babies who use the kits I give you our sincere thanks.

It's been a very busy year with all the Area 3 clubs hosting many wonderful fundraising activities, awards nights and providing financial supports for recipient projects and individuals. The Birthing Kit assembly days and Breast Cushion making sessions have continued with great enthusiasm.

Over the past year we have had many members inducted into the WA Women's Hall of Fame, recognised for their commitment to service, for length of service, and named on the D23 Governor's Heide Taylor Honour Roll. Congratulations to Lennie McCall and Margaret Metcalf from Zonta Club of Perth.

Congratulations also to Margaret Field from Zonta Club of Perth Northern Suburbs who recently was awarded the City of Stirling Community Service Award in the category of innovation. The mayor awarded Margaret with a framed certificate for her contribution in setting up holiday camps for women and children from domestic violence situations, safety seminars for migrant women, voluntary work in teaching English to migrants, helping stroke patients with speech and working as an oral historian.

The Area 3 Women of Achievement 2011 was awarded at our annual Founders Dinner at the Mallard Duck in the Swan valley on the 5 November. The awardee Dianne Annear has a career spanning a period of over 40 years and has used her deep compassion and empathy and extensive managerial skills to care for women in crisis. This enviable achievement has been accomplished both professionally and in a wide-ranging voluntary capacity, including practical and emotional support to abused women. Under Diane's guidance the Zonta Women's Refuge was established in 1984. The service proved to be a successful agency accommodating more than 1,000 women in its first 3 years of operation. The services offer 3 meals a day, shared accommodation, emotional support, financial advice. advocacy, transport and assistance in finding alternative accommodation after the resident have left the refuge. Dianne also established a not-forprofit Women's Legal Referral Service in 2000. This service assists domestic violence victims who are deemed ineligible for Legal Aid, to pursue property settlements, and provides the legal support for women to gain financial independence. So high was Diane's reputation within the legal profession, she convinced two lawyer friends to assist pro-bono when the cases became complex. The Women's Legal Referral Service now has a network of pro bono and community service providers which operates full time, assisted by funds from the Law Society and the State Attorney General's Department.

We have many outstanding women in Area 3 who work quietly to achieve the objectives of Zonta and beyond. It is always wonderful to see them recognised for their contribution to our community.

As an Area we can all be proud that we have achieved our goals within the District for 2011.The focus on retention and rejuvenation of members has seen many clubs induct new members this year and also develop many creative ways to promote Zonta. It has been a fantastic boast to see the increase in media, local paper and radio coverage of club events this year.

We have a great deal to be proud of, but much remains to be done. As we look ahead to the future, we will need to continue to use the expertise, experience, and enthusiasm of our members effectively and efficiently. It is in our members that we will increase our membership and raise awareness of Zontians' dedication to advancing the status of women locally and globally through service and advocacy.

Meeting Malalai Joya

On Wednesday 31 August, Area 2 Zonta/SAWA Liaison Rita Fletcher (Support Association for Women in Afghanistan) and Lt Governor Cintra Amos were privileged to be part of an intimate lunch to meet Malalai Joya, who had previously that week appeared on the ABC program Q&A.

Malalai is an activist, writer and former Parliamentarian in the National Assembly of Afghanistan from 2005-2007 before being dismissed for publicly denouncing the presence of what she considered to be warlords and war criminals in the Afghan Parliament.

Her suspension generated international protest and appeals for her reinstatement have been signed by high profile writers, intellectuals and members of parliament from several countries. She has been called "the bravest woman in Afghanistan". In 2010 Time Magazine placed her on their annual list of the 100 most influential people in the world, Foreign Policy Magazine listed Malalai in its annual list of the Top 100 Global Thinkers and, in March 2011 The Guardian listed her among Top 100 Women Activists and Campaigners. The BBC has called her "the most famous woman in Afghanistan" and the Washington Post said "Her truth is that warlords should not be permitted to hide behind the mask of democracy to hold on to their chairs".

Malalai is 33 years old and was born in Afghanistan. When she was just 4 years old her family fled Afghanistan to live as refugees in Iran. She became involved in humanitarian work while in eighth grade. Malalai returned to Afghanistan after the Soviet withdrawal in 1998 during the Taliban's reign, and at 20 began work as a social activist. Because she was "unemployed" and "lived underground" the US denied Malalai a travel visa earlier this year, which sparked a public campaign by supporters to pressure the US Government. However, the US State Department later advised that a visa had been issued, and she started her speaking tour in the US in March.

She has been attacked physically and verbally and has received many death threats, but Malalai says "They will kill me but they will not kill my voice because it will be the voice of all Afghan women – you can cut the flower, but you cannot stop the coming of spring". Malalai has escaped four assassination attempts and travels with six bodyquards wherever she goes.

Internationally she has received many awards and honours and, in 2009, released her book "Raising My Voice: the extraordinary story of an Afghan who dares to speak out" which has been translated into several languages. The New York Times wrote "...her story bears witness to the horrific experience known as being female in Afghanistan."

Malalai is unquestionably passionate and courageous but, despite being so outspoken, she is a softly spoken and gentle woman and we enjoyed her company immensely. While her story is a chilling one, Malalai told us at lunch that she does see rays of hope for the future.

That evening she spoke at the Hawke Centre and Rita Fletcher attended the evening with Sonia Ziaee, 2011 District 23 winner of the Jane M Klausman Scholarship.

As during Q&A, she spoke out about corrupt warlords and of the various difficulties Afghanistan is still facing in spite of the many years of foreign intervention, not the least of which is that of corrupt warlords particularly in the provinces where girls are often in danger if attending school. This creates a dilemma for parents who would like to see their daughters educated.

Malalai feels strongly that American and Australian troops should leave as little has changed, and that a country can only solve its problems from within. She spoke of American money being misused and of the number of civilians, often women and children, who have been killed during bombing and the abuse by a small minority of American troops. Sadly this is a normal occurrence in any war.

What was particularly interesting was a very lively debate after the meeting closed with a group of Afghan Uni students challenging Malalai about her view on the removal of foreign troops. They agreed with many things she had said but maintained that without foreign intervention, there would be more corruption and chaos and a magic wand would need to be waved to solve their internal problems.

It is certainly a most contentious issue.

Firstly I wish to thank all the D23 members who were so welcoming to me when I attended your fabulous conference in Melbourne. I have to also relate that I have already worn the fascinator I bought for the dinner for Melbourne Cup day and I'm sure that's why I was reasonably successful at the sweeps. My report to you will cover aspects of the work of the AWC.

Lunch with Global Ambassador Penny Williams

On the 7 November a small group of AWC members will have lunch with Penny Williams at the Sydney Australian Passport Office. Ms Williams has recently been appointed in the newly formed position as Global Ambassador for Women and Girls. In the letter written to congratulate Ms Williams of her appointment we drew her attention to several of the AWC's priorities which we believe are relevant to her new portfolio area:

- advocating for a long-term model of care for survivors of sexual violence, both nationally and globally (for eg through our links with the Medical Women's International Association);
- advocating for reform on the trafficking of women;
- social inclusion, particularly among Australia's refugee and immigrant women;
- enhancing leadership opportunities for women, particularly young women from non-English speaking backgrounds and communities;
- advocating on behalf of incarcerated women and girls, particularly Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women and girls.

The group will comprise of myself representing Zonta International D23, State Commissioner of Girl Guides NSW, the AWC Coordinator Frances Panopoulos, Conflict Resolving Women's Network and NSW Lifeline President Robyn Gaspari (past D24 Governor), and Associate Professor Jennifer Burn of the Anti-Slavery Project. Areas raised will include agreement with the Pan of Action concern of the lack of coordination on the groups for Australian NGO (Non Government Organisations) projects when dealing with regulations, customs, communication and transport. The important issues of achieving the MDG's (Millennium Development Goals) concerning women and girls particularly the areas of violence and health will also be of importance.

Support for Women's Health

All members of AWC have been proud to be selected as a supporting organisation for the upcoming pilot to inform patients on the treatment for fragility fractures. AWC was involved in advocating for better Federal and State government support in the early 2000 and now we have returned to take up the case again. The one-day GP Workshop and half-day Patient Seminar aim to raise the awareness around osteoporosis, a disease affecting 2.2 million Australians. The objective of HELLO is to reduce the number of fragility fractures and their associated negative impact on quality of life, morbidity and premature mortality.

Many fragility fractures are preventable through healthy lifestyle interventions, early detection and, most importantly, appropriate management in those at high risk. The HELLO series will address these important and often neglected topics. On the 26 and 27 November the event will be supported by an excellent line up of speakers, all of whom are experts in their field. The Garvan Institute is also delighted that the Governor General, Ms Quentin Bryce AC, has indicated her strong support for this educational activity and will be opening the Patient Seminar.

This is a collaborative venture, which could not happen without adequate support. Sincere thanks goes to the HELLO sponsors and supporting organisations of which AWC is one of them along with Rural Health Education Foundation, large pharmaceutical companies and Osteoporosis Australia. The Australian Women's Coalition is recognised with the link to the Australian Federation of Medical women and the wide range of women's organisations within our members. Professor John Eisman AO, Director, Osteoporosis and Bone Biology Program, Garvan Institute of Medical Research plans that theses seminars will, if successful in Sydney, be rolled out to major centres and rural areas of Australia. Luisa spoke about the national advocacy we can do as an organisation and the importance of women finding a voice together.

NSW Law and Justice Foundation

The AWC has received a positive response from the Law Foundation whom we contacted to gain support for further research and support for long term responses for survivors of sexual violence. The Director Geoff Mulherin, after reviewing the Happy Healthy Women Report the AWC produced last year said the research was very important and useful work. and suggests that there could be scope for an application to the Foundation for a grant to further the work of any one of a number of the recommendations you cite. The AWC committee is seeking further support in this important advocacy area.
