On my rounds of the clubs in my new role as Governor I am often asked two questions: Am I enjoying the role? It must be a lot of work?

I have inherited a financially strong District, with a great membership growth record and recently revised governance documents. This means the District Board can consider the next steps. As for the hard work, this is okay when it is not viewed as a grind but an opportunity to work with others and discuss future opportunities. Have you identified the "Conviction" and

"Commitment" messages in my story so far? Obviously the next point is "Courage". I have been having some one-on-one conversations with past and present district leaders about how to support our clubs and make our district stronger. Considering change does require courage not only to initiate the conversation but also to listen to alternative points of view. I thank all those who have given me time and provided wise counsel.

Clubs will soon receive the D23 Goals and Measures. While the goals are ambitious I believe it is worth stretching our efforts even if we may not prove to be successful in all areas. Clubs will be asked to develop their set of goals for the biennium that align with District and ZI goals. The board will be working on the D23 Strategic Plan at our

February board meeting. This will incorporate actions and timelines into the goals and measures and will align with the ZI Strategic Plan to be released in the New Year.

Congratulations to the following clubs on celebrating special milestones since the last Newsflash: ZC Kyneton 20 years, ZC Noarlunga South Vales 30 years, ZC Central Goldfields 2 years, ZC Geelong 35 years and ZC Pt Lincoln 20 years. While I have not been able to accept invitations to all these events I have done my best to attend as many as possible.

A week in country Victoria in October provided me with opportunities to meet with members of ZC Kyneton, ZC Ballarat, ZC Central Goldfields and attend the Presidents' meeting in Area 4. A week in WA in November for family reasons enabled me to meet members from all the Area 3 clubs at a Founders Day dinner organised by ZC Swan Hills. I was also able to visit members of ZC Perth, ZC Dunsborough, ZC Peel and attend a meeting of the Presidents and D23 leaders from Area 3. Thank you to my home hosts and those who opened their homes for afternoon tea for club members to come and meet me. We have so many members who exhibit great generosity of spirit. I enjoyed every moment of these visits that have provided me with a greater understanding of your part of the world and provided me with an opportunity to share with you some of the wider Zonta story.

THE ZONTA THANKS

For new members I thought it might be useful for you to know the origin of the "Zonta Thanks" (previously known as the Zonta Grace) that is read at each of the Zonta club dinner meetings in D23.



The words are very thoughtful and seem so embedded in Zonta that you may be amazed to know that they were written by Tricia Summerfield a member of ZC Perth in our

district. Tricia became a Zontian two days before her wedding in 1977 and later became the first member of her club to have a baby, although others were mothers when they joined. She tells me that "baby" is due to have her own baby in February.

Tricia was an Area Director of WA, SA, NT when it was part of District 16 (now New Zealand). It was her board that made the decision to divide up the district as the

growth was making it unmanageable. Tricia was President of her club 2001-02 and has again taken on the role finishing her term next year. She is the D23 Chairman of History & Archives 2014-16.

I have Tricia's approval to recirculate the words to the current group of Governors and invite them to include them as part of the dinner meeting procedure. As a new member myself I thought the test of a true Zontian was to know the words of the Zonta Thanks without having to read them. I can now do that, I encourage you to do likewise. Some clubs encourage this by inviting everyone - members and guests, to read and say the Thanks before the meal.

Wherever your country of birth, whatever your faith or creed, give thanks for the meal we share today in Zonta fellowship.

But remember too, those who have had no food today, not with guilt that we have so much, but with hope, through Zonta service, they too may come to share the same in peace and harmony

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Advocacy initiatives

I have been working closely with the Governors of D22 (Qld) and D24 (NSW & ACT) along with our respective district advocacy chairmen to collaborate on a number of national advocacy efforts. In particular a submission has been made by D22, supported by D23 and D24 to the Prime Minister, Federal Ministers, Leader of the Opposition and Shadow Ministers, giving a national Zonta perspective on the progress made by Australia on the 12 strategic objectives outlined in the 'Beijing Platform For Action'. The Federal Government is required to present a report to the UN Human Rights Council for the Universal Period Review of Australia in March 2015. ZI President Maria Jose has sent an email to the governors congratulating us for our collaboration.

D23 has joined with D22 and D24 as a member of Equality Rights Alliance (ERA), one of the six national women's alliances. To formalise our agreement the Governors have signed a Memorandum of Understanding to outline how we will work together. This is important as only organisations with a national presence may be members of ERA and while we will only have one vote, each district will have input.

ZI Service Project – Voices Against Violence

I have been invited by our ZI President Maria Jose to represent ZI at the opening ceremony of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) Asian Pacific Conference in Melbourne on December 1. The project Voices Against Violence, run by UN Women in collaboration with WAGGGS and ZI will be launched at the Conference. Contrary to expectations Australia is not one of the 12 participant countries. I have expressed my disappointment to our ZI Liaison Sally Bean. Maria Jose has responded saying she will ensure that there is direct dialogue between the governors of D22, D23, D24 and UN

Women and WAGGGS. I will keep you informed.





Greetings all. This is my first report to you and I am pleased to say I have contacted all relevant tertiary organisations in our District 23 to encourage suitable applicants to apply for the great awards from the Fellowship Program. I have even tracked down one from British Aerospace here in Adelaide but feel quite frustrated that I have no way of knowing how many, if any, applications have been submitted.

Since the ZI Convention in Orlando the International UN committee has developed their 12 page Strategic Plan to meet the overall International goals agreed at that meeting. Our District Board is using the information from the International Board to develop the District goals which will be finalized in February. This means there is still a window of opportunity for Club UN Groups to send me their wish lists or to share the plans you have already made.

As I discussed in the last Newsflash some crucial decisions will need to be made by the UN in 2015 about what follows the expiry of the Millennium Development goals.

As I write this no less than 80 Zontians have registered to join Simone Ovart at the NGO forum in Geneva to frame and co -ordinate our input on the 12 Critical Areas of Concern adopted as the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action (BDPfA).

Advocacy Plans in Clubs and Areas in D23 are turning into Action .

Congratulations to Area 1&4 for improving access for women and raising awareness in support of the Deinfibulation Clinic at the Royal Women's Hospital in Melbourne. There are an increasing number of

immigrants and refugees arriving in Australia who have experienced Female Genital Mutilation and are seeking culturally appropriate information about options for reversal of FGM. A cheque for \$7,000 was presented to the clinic.

So the easy part is over. The rest is up to individual clubs to hold a function to contribute funds to the AE Fellowship Program. ZI cannot continue to provide such financial support to these highly motivated women unless the money is topped up. I realise many clubs in D23 have overlooked putting Amelia Earhart's birthday celebration on January 11th into their club planning calendar. I have sent an email to all club contacts asking to be advised of what you are planning and I intend to collate dates and send it out to all clubs so we can support each other,

This is part of the process of discerning what women around the world believe are the highest priorities to be successful in empowering women to achieving equality in all spheres and nations. I have listed here those 12 areas which were considered critical 20 years ago.
