District 23 Zontians,

On behalf of District 23 Governor Sandra Burns, we are delighted to announce registration for our Conference is **NOW OPEN!**

The early bird period will run until 31 July 2021, whereupon full registration commence. Registration closes on 29th August 2021. Please see link below.

In light of the difficulties associated with COVID-19 lockdowns announced with very little notice, to give District 23 Zontians comfort in the registration process, the District 23 Board has approved the following refund policy for all registrants.

#### **Refunds COVID-19**

- **If the event is cancelled by the venue due to Victorian State Government orders, all registrants will receive a full refund of their registration (excluding booking fee).**
- **If a specific state in District 23 is locked down and registrants are prevented from travelling to Victoria due to that state government's orders, even though the event will proceed, registrants from that state only will receive a full refund of their registration (excluding booking fee).**

- **Costs associated with travel cancellations, including, but not limited to flights, accommodation, ground transfers etc., are the responsibility of the registrant. Any quarantine requirements, including costs, of the home state of the registrant, are the registrant's responsibility.**

**NOTE: Refunds may take up to 60 days to process and will be refunded via the method used to purchase the tickets.**

#### **General:**

- **Refunds requested for reasons other than those advised above, will incur an administration fee of \$50 if notification is made prior to 1<sup>st</sup> September 2021.**
- **Refund requests received after 1<sup>st</sup> September 2021, for reasons other than those advised above, will be reviewed on a case by case basis. In this instance a refund is not guaranteed. Registrations may be revised or transferred prior to 1 September 2021.**

#### **IMPORTANT VENUE INFORMATION**

When the Conference was booked in at The Capital Theatre, COVID-19 did not exist. Whilst The Capital is a wonderful venue, we were finding limitations in what we were able to do with our Welcome Reception, Market Place, lunches and morning/ afternoon tea breaks due to capacity limits in the various reception rooms.

Registrants would not have been able to move freely between spaces. City of Greater Bendigo events offered the use of Ulumbarra Theatre as an alternative venue. You will find further information about the venue on the following page. It is only a short walk from the Capital Theatre, so those who have booked accommodation in the vicinity will still be close by. This venue will give us the capacity to have any activities outside our plenary sessions all in one place, with the exception of the Conference dinner, which will be held at the Bendigo Town Hall.

## Introducing Ulumbarra

Meaning "gather together or "meeting place" in the language of the Dja Dja Wurrung people, Ulumbarra blends heritage and modern elements beautifully, offering distinctive state-of-the-art performance and event spaces.

The original Sandhurst Gaol opened in 1863 and was decommissioned in 2006. Former inmates include Chopper Read and Ronald Ryan. In 1987 it was the scene of Victoria's longest prison siege, when inmate John Dixon Jenkins took nine hostages claiming he had a hand-made bomb.



With wings radiating from a central hub, the design was based upon the much-publicised Pentonville concept. This design enabled the surveillance of multiple wings from a central point whilst allowing a reasonable amount of air to circulate the cellblocks. Although five wings were allowed for in the original plan, only two wings were ever constructed at the Bendigo Gaol.

Designed by Melbourne architects Y2 and international theatre design specialists Schuler Shook, Ulumbarra merges contemporary design with the heritage elements of the old gaol architecture. Construction of Ulumbarra commenced in 2013. With an auditorium capacity of 951, expansive foyers, studios and auxiliary spaces, Ulumbarra Theatre's architects have cleverly adapted this historic gaol to create an extraordinary arts and community facility. Once patrons travel inside the high prison walls, they are greeted by the expansive entry wings and foyers which blend the original Gold-Rush era prison environment and modern architectural materials used in the new build. The old cell doors and huge granite blocks have largely been untouched with some of the cells remaining opened and furnished to give at least a small glimpse of life behind the bars of the old Bendigo Prison.

## DINING & SHOPPING



Find out why the city was named UNESCO Creative City of Gastronomy at our restaurants, cafes, farmers markets and fresh food stores. Dine in a former glass factory, a heritage-listed Beaurepaires site, visit laneways and basements such as: **Chancery Lane** with its boutiques, coffee and food, and wall art; **Lyttleton Terrace** is becoming a hub for foodies in Bendigo, enjoy a range of coffee, food and juice outlets: **Bath Lane** is another hub of cafes and interesting boutiques, homewares shop (note the bronze statue at the entrance to Bath Lane commemorating the former pig markets that existed there). If you venture a little further from the City Centre check out Edwards Providore at Kennington Village, Condon St Kennington offering good coffee and food, but also a great Providore and a range of plants and homewares. Lake Weeroona has the Boardwalk Café or the Coffee truck – walk around the lake before, after or with your coffee (ice cream or gelati also available from 'Flavours' across the road).

## WINERIES



The first grapes were planted in the Bendigo region in 1855 just after the start of the massive gold rushes which brought tens of thousands of hopeful diggers from all over the world to Bendigo to seek their fortunes. They brought with them a lust for gold, but also the wine and food knowledge of Europe and it was only a few years before the judges at the 1873 Vienna Exhibition were heard to exclaim of Bendigo's early Hermitage (Shiraz) wines that "no Colonial wine can be that good". Bendigo region wineries are mostly run by the families who founded them. Nearly all grapes are picked by hand and handcrafted by the producer, and the resultant wines are available at cellar door, online from individual wineries, at their events or through restaurants. The gentle rolling hills that fold away from Central Victoria's granite outcrops to Bendigo hold a revelation – stunning wines with a rich heritage. Treat your tastebuds and uncover the hidden gems of our region with one of Bendigo Wine Trails. Offering a diverse range of wine styles, food options and things to see and do, there's a trail for everyone.
